A golden beach in the north
Ever dreamt of sunbathing in the midnight sun, on an island in the North Atlantic? Nauthólsvík Geothermal Beach is a paradise for people who love splashing around in the ocean or sunbathing in the golden sand. The beach is equipped with changing facilities and showers, steam-baths and hot tubs. Hot water is pumped into the man-made lagoon and the outcome is a refreshing swimming area averaging between 15°-19°C in summer.

Information:

Hot water is plentiful in Iceland and the country's inhabitants have found ways to use it since the settlement. Swimming is more than just a sport in Iceland; it is a way of life. After swimming a few refreshing laps, locals waddle over to the hot tubs for a soak and a chat. Swimming pools in Iceland are nothing like in most European Cities. If you truly want to follow in the footsteps of the locals, you should visit one of Reykjavik's many swimming pools. You could say our pools are a mix of a sport-centre, water-slide Park and a spa with hot tubs and steam baths. Run on geothermal water from boreholes, this is where Iceland's hot springs meet the city culture.
